TSU through CCLGSPD initiative, Moncada LGU forge partnership; P 1.8 M funding secured



Tarlac State University thru the Center for Community and Local Governance Studies and Policy Development and the local government of Moncada Tarlac sealed a partnership in a Memorandum of Agreement in anticipation of the municipality's 150th Founding Anniversary at the Moncada Municipal Hall last May 31, 2024.

The project dubbed "Preserving Moncada's Legacy: A Path to 150 years (Moncada@150)" aims to publish a book from 1874 - 2024 enveloped with Moncada town's rich heritage, history, traditions through the help of the Former Commissioner of the National Historical Commission of the Philippines, Dr. Lino Dizon, a retired professor and former

Director of the Center for Tarlaqueno Studies. The LGU allocated P1.8 million for this two-year project since it will cover various activities such as: archival research, cultural mapping, community workshops and awareness, Moncada cultural identity and branding, educational initiatives, and digitization of archives.

Enhancing Child Protection Policy: TSU, Anao solidify Project CARE thru MOA Signing Ceremony



To strengthen child protection policy, the Center for Community and Local Governance Studies and Policy Development (CCLGSPD) and Anao's local government sealed the partnership for the CARE Anao Project (Consultancy and Research on Localizing Child Protection Policy in the Municipality of Anao) on the ceremonial signing of the Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) at last May 8, 2024 the Main AVR.

Through this project, the School of Law's legal aid clinic will offer legal assistance to the town alongside the guidance and counseling services of the College of Arts and Social Sciences Psychology

Department.

Meanwhile, the CCLGSPD will conduct capacity-building activities for teachers and owners of childcare centers and public schools in Anao, as well as create a localized child protection policy in consultation with the Municipal Social Welfare Development and the municipal stakeholders.

According to Ms. Vien Jamaica Samson, Local Government and Policy Development Department Head, the center started its two-year project in February 2024. The capacity development activities will commence after drafting the policy and advocacy programs. Local officials will also be involved in the training, which

includes handling cases of violence and child abuse.

Vice Mayor Jocelyn Punzalan, who represented Anao Mayor Gian Pierre De Dios, said they are grateful to TSU for catering projects and partnerships in their town, which is a third-class municipality. "We are committed to ensuring the safety and wellbeing of our children in our community. Our child protection policy aims to localize resources and support, ensuring swift action and tailored intervention. Let's work together to create a secure environment for our children to thrive in," Mayor De Dios said, as read by Vice Mayor Punzalan.

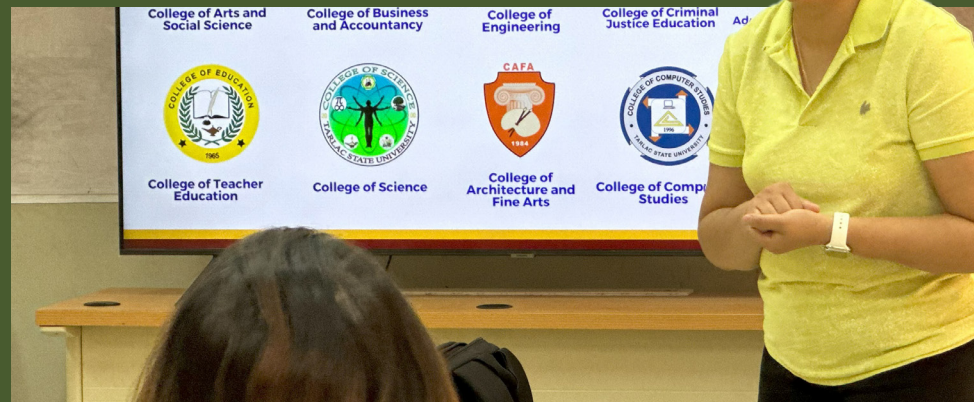
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CCLGSPD, CASS discuss Future Collaboration

Empowering Youth Governance: SK Baras-Baras collabs with CCLGSPD for Kabataan Profiling Initiatives



Barangay Baras-Baras, Tarlac City, hosted the Project "K.A.P.A.B.I.L.D. "Kabataan Advancement: Profiling, Consultancy, and Capacity Building Initiatives for the SK and KK in Baras-Baras, Tarlac "City"—Phase 1" on April 13, 2024, to strengthen youth governance and initiatives. The Center for Community and Local Governance Studies and Policy Development (CCLGSPD) and the College of Public Administration and Governance led the project, which gathered comprehensive data and information about the youth's status in the barangay to enhance service delivery.

Under the banner of collaborative engagement, faculty and students from CPAG, along with senior high school students from Baras-Baras Senior High School led by Mr. Jon Henry B. Ordoñez, and officials from the Alternative Learning System (ALS) under the Department of Education, actively participated in gathering crucial KK information utilizing a tool developed by the CCLGSPD, which includes demographic information, challenges, problems, and proposed

interventions focusing on Centers of Youth Participation by the National Youth Commission.

Central to the success of the profiling activity was the initiative and vision of the Barangay Sanguiang Kabataan Council, led by SK Chairperson Hon. Rochelle Kate T. Tagara. Under her guidance, the endeavor achieved the project's objectives, which are to foster a deeper understanding of youth's needs and aspirations and lay the groundwork for informed decision-making and responsive governance.

Furthermore, the Training and Doctrine Command (TRADOC) Philippine Army-Armor Division, particularly in terms of vehicular assistance, provided logistical support that ensured the smooth execution of the activity. This demonstrated the importance of interagency cooperation in community initiatives.

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On March 4, 2024, Assistant Professor Jayson Y. Punzalan presented an informative session titled "ICT on Board 1.0," which gave child development workers in Gerona and Victoria relevant knowledge about the use of information and communication technology (ICT) in the classroom.

The workshop explored the differences between high-tech and low-tech technology, highlighting how they can improve the caliber of services and care provided to children. Mr. Punzalan outlined useful strategies for teachers to smoothly incorporate technology into their lesson plans, creating a more participatory and dynamic learning environment.



Assoc. Prof. Laarni T. Capinding conducted a lecture titled "Classroom Discipline: Dealing with Difficult and Challenging Children 2.0" on March 4, 2023, held at SB Hall Ramos, Tarlac. The seminar underscored the value of continual professional growth in the field of education, providing daycare teachers' useful tools and techniques for fostering an environment of learning that is encouraging and supportive for their children.

Participants were grouped based on their years of service and were asked to share their experiences working with challenging and difficult kids at daycare facilities. This collaborative approach fostered a rich exchange of ideas and best practices among workers, enhancing the overall learning experience.



On April 22, 2024, Associate Professor Arlyn C. Cura, from the College of Education, delivered an enriching lecture and workshop on "Teaching Technique 1: Leveling Up Inquiry-Based Learning" at Paniqui Public Auditorium.

Focusing on Inquiry-Based Learning (IBL), a pedagogical approach that encourages students to actively explore concepts, ask questions, and construct their understanding, Associate Professor Arlyn C. Cura's session provided a comprehensive overview of its principles and practical applications. CDW attendees were immersed in dynamic discussions and engaging activities to foster critical thinking, problem-solving skills, and a deeper understanding of child development principles. Through hands-on exercises and collaborative learning experiences, participants gained valuable insights into implementing IBL effectively within their educational contexts.

One of the highlights of the seminar-workshop was the emphasis on tailoring inquiry-based techniques to suit children's developmental stages and learning styles. Associate Professor Arlyn C. Cura emphasized the importance of creating inclusive and stimulating learning environments that cater to the diverse needs of every child, nurturing their curiosity and fostering a lifelong love for learning.



To empower educators with effective ways of handling classroom behaviors, a seminar titled "Classroom Discipline: Dealing with Difficult and Challenging Children 1.0 and 2.0" was conducted in Moncada, Tarlac, on April 22, 2024. The event, organized under Project START sessions, featured Dr. Marie Paz H. Angeles and Assoc. Prof. Laarni T. Capinding, as the resource speaker, imparted their expertise in educational psychology and classroom management.

Assoc. Prof. Capinding emphasized the value of developing rapport with the children. She provided valuable insights and practical techniques to address the diverse needs of students. Dr. Angeles highlighted the management of challenging behaviors and the need for effective communication and positive reinforcement. Utilizing behavioral psychology research, they both emphasized the significance of consistency and sensitivity in attending to each student's unique requirements.



The Victoria Municipal Social Welfare and Development Office hosted Project START's sessions on May 13, 2024. Dr. Arlyn C. Cura presented her topic, "Teaching Technique 1: Level Up Inquiry-Based Learning," highlighting the importance of inquiry-based learning, which empowers students to ask questions and engage in exploratory learning. In her remarks, she emphasized the potential of this approach to improve critical thinking abilities and enable children to be independent.

Prof. Elizabeth P. Balanquit tackled "The Buzz of Teaching English Among Children" during the afternoon session. She presented an in-depth lecture on the use of creative techniques and assisted child development workers in establishing an exciting and dynamic educational setting that sustains children's energy and drive toward English language education.



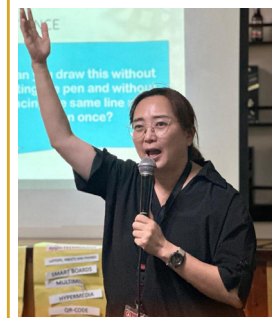
A seminar workshop was held on May 20, 2024, at the Paniqui Backstage Auditorium for child development workers in Anao and Paniqui. During the morning session, Prof. Elizabeth P. Balanquit led a captivating discussion titled "The Buzz of Teaching English Among Children." In a creative exercise, CDWs collaborated to create a story and then engaged in a group storytelling activity. This hands-on approach not only fostered teamwork but also highlighted effective techniques for making English lessons more engaging for young learners.

During the afternoon session, the discussion shifted to guidance and counseling, highlighting the significance of taking a comprehensive approach to early childhood education. The lecture titled "Resilient Foundations: Effective Guidance and Counseling in Early Childhood Education," delivered by Dr. Erwin P. Lacañale emphasized the use of effective counseling strategies to promote the emotional and psychological well-being of young learners.



On May 13, 2024, Project Start held a seminar-workshop in Pura, Tarlac, to improve educational methodologies, specifically by incorporating information and communication technology (ICT) and offering effective guidance and counseling in early childhood education. The morning session, led by Asst. Prof. Jayson Y. Punzalan, focused on the integration of advanced technology in early childhood education, showcasing the potential of digital tools and resources to enhance learning experiences by making them more dynamic and interactive. He introduced an innovative instructional strategy known as the flipped classroom, where students learn by watching video lectures at home and then apply their knowledge in the classroom through collaborative activities and hands-on projects.

Dr. Erwin P. Lacañale addressed the audience in the afternoon, delivering a talk titled "Resilient Foundations: Effective Guidance and Counseling in Early Childhood Education". He shared a set of practical strategies for implementing effective guidance and counseling practices, including active listening, empathy, and creating safe spaces for children to freely express their feelings. In addition, he highlighted the positive outcomes that can result from these practices, including academic improvement, stronger social abilities, and increased emotional strength.



An enriching seminar workshop was conducted by Project Start in Moncada, Tarlac on May 20, 2024. Asst. Prof. Jayson Y. Punzalan recently presented "ICT on Board 1.0," showcasing the ways in which technology can enhance the learning experience for children. Through his demonstration, he highlighted how these technological approaches can foster active participation and facilitate deeper understanding among students.

Dr. Jiyoun Lee presented a lecture titled "Arts and Crafts 101 for Children" during the afternoon session of the seminar workshop. She highlighted the significance of integrating arts and crafts into early childhood education to nurture creativity, enhance fine motor skills, and encourage emotional expression. A variety of practical tips and activities were shared, aimed at helping teachers seamlessly incorporate arts and crafts into their curriculum.



On June 18, 2024, Mr. Nestor Jan L. Suba, an invited expert from Ecumenical Christian College, led a seminar-workshop for Gerona and Victoria Child Development Workers in Gerona, Tarlac. The morning session tackled "Understanding Unique Learners: Exploring the Characteristics of Children with Special Needs." Mr. Suba explored the significance of taking proactive measures to detect and understand the unique characteristics and needs of these children. He guided CDWs through an exploration of various developmental, cognitive, and emotional challenges that may manifest in them. In the afternoon session, he addressed the critical role CDWs play in providing guidance and support through his lecture titled "Gabay sa Pagtuturo ng mga Batang Naiiba, Ngunit Hindi mas Mababa." He discussed important strategies for fostering the development of children with special needs, promoting inclusivity, and avoiding discrimination simultaneously. The workshop grouped participants accordingly, providing them with practical scenarios to apply their newly acquired knowledge. CDWs contemplated appropriate strategies to ensure inclusivity and assistance for these children.

OVRDE conducts AI-TECH Workshop to foster Innovation for Sustainable Communities



Tarlac State University's key officials, deans, and directors, along with representatives from the various centers, Provincial and Local Government Planning and Development Offices attended the first two-day international hybrid training and workshop on AITECH last May 21-22, 2024 at the Alumni Center, Lucinda Campus.

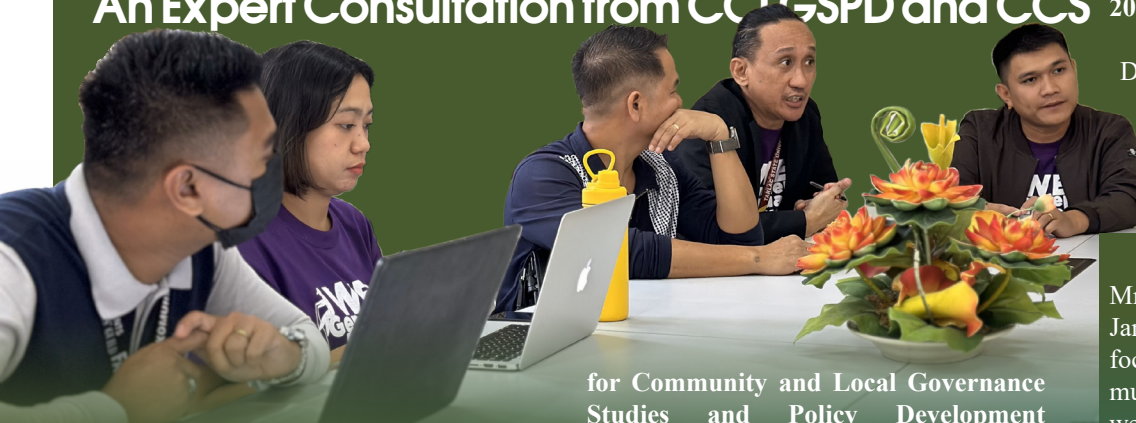
